KEY NOTE SPEAKERS AND



Gordon Stobart is Emeritus Professor of Education, Institute of Education, University of London and Senior Research Fellow at Oxford University. He was a founder member of the Assessment Reform Group and much of his recent work has involved promoting formative assessment as part of improving teaching and learning.

His current work is on how experts learn and the implications for classroom teaching and learning. His most recent book is The Expert Learner - challenging the myth of ability (2014, OUP/ McGraw-Hill). He is a former editor of the international journal Assessment in Education: Principles, Policy and Practice and author of Testing times- the uses and abuses of assessment.



Deirdre Butler is a senior lecturer in Education at St. Patrick's College with responsibility for designing and coordinating learning programmes for undergraduate and postgraduate students using a broad range of digital technologies.

She has extensive experience in the theory and practice of digital learning and in the fostering of 21st century learning skills. She is involved in a number of international projects including the Horizon K12 group, Innovative Teaching & Learning Research and New Pedagogies for Deep Learning.



Majella Dempsey lectures on Curriculum, Teaching, Learning and Assessment in Maynooth University and is course leader for the Bachelor of Science with Education and the Bachelor of Mathematics with Education. She is currently finalising doctoral research at Trinity College Dublin on the role of key skills in developing and promoting innovative teaching and learning.



Audrey Doyle is principal of St Joseph's College, Lucan. In recent years she has led a review of assessment practices within the school alongside promoting the development of key skills within teaching, learning and assessment.

Audrey has shared this work with many schools and is also Associate Trainer with the JCT team.



Cherryl Elliot is a teacher in Our Lady of Good Counsel Special School, Cork - the first special school to introduce Interactive Whiteboards and iPads. She is also an Apple Distinguished Educator, an e-tutor for the PDST and offers training in the use of iPads with SEN for teachers, clinicians and parents.



Prof Gary Granville, is Head of the Faculty of Education at the National College of Art and Design (NCAD) and was Chairperson of the NCCA Board of Studies for Arts and Humanities.

Sarah Keane began her teaching career in St. Paul's National School, Dooradoyle, Limerick. More recently, Sarah worked as a tutor with the National Centre for Technology in Education (NCTE) delivering professional development summer courses to primary school teachers. In 2011, Sarah became involved with the Aistear Tutor Initiative and she currently facilitates Aistear workshops for teachers.



Ben Murray is an Education Officer with the NCCA, with responsibility for arts education. He is currently involved with two digital learning projects, one on the use of digital portfolios and the other on collaborative approaches to assessing critical problem solving skills.



Bianca Ní Ghrógáin is a primary teacher, currently on career break from Griffeen Valley Educate Together National School. She is currently studying in DCU, where she is researching the use of technology as a classroom tool at primary level. Her workshop will showcase the tools, methods and assessment practices that have allowed her to design situations where pupils learn fundamental concepts by doing something creative while developing and demonstrating key skills.



Cliona O'Keeffe is Principal of Our Lady's BNS, Ballinteer Dublin. Prior to becoming Principal she spent two years on secondment to the National Council for Curriculum and Assessment where she worked as Education Officer - Primary Assessment. This role involved working with schools on introducing Assessment for Learning

techniques into classrooms.



Norman Emerson has over 25 years of teaching and management experience in Scottish schools and was previously Assistant Director within Education Scotland with responsibility for qualifications and assessment. Norman has recently taken up his post as Director, Curriculum and Assessment with the NCCA where he looks forward to applying his experience, skills and knowledge to the fresh challenges associated with supporting developments within the Irish education system
